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cooperation with the Community Corrections Council, and then as the amendment goes further down, you begin to talk relative to the commission. Is it your intent here for the Community Corrections Council to kind of serve as the grant maker here, in terms of a local subdivision or a local nonprofit would make application; is it to the Community Corrections Council and the council would serve as a depository of applications for these grants, and then they would decide? Or is it a mechanism within the crime commission separate and apart from the Community Corrections Council?

SENATOR BURLING: My intent, Senator Synowiecki, was that the money goes to the crime commission, Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice, and then the Community Corrections Council and that commission would work together to develop the criteria, the forms that people apply on, and assist them--work together making those decisions.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Who would have the ultimate authority relative to awarding a grant? Would it be the commission, Senator Burling, or would it be the Community Corrections Council, by vote, in terms of actually awarding the grant?

SENATOR BURLING: My intention was the commission would have the last authority on that, but I'm not a stickler on that.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Senator Burling, does the...and I really don't know. Does the commission have a mechanism available to them now to go through a grant-making scheme and to accept applications, and do they have now a protocol and a procedure to award competitive grants for a methamphetamine program such as this?

SENATOR BURLING: It's my understanding that they currently award grants for other areas such as substance abuse treatment, but not prevention. So apparently they do have a mechanism set up. That's my understanding.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Senator Burling, would you be at all interested, if this amendment does advance, of perhaps...the Community Corrections Council has present on its panel a law
