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only distinguish but to say that this money can't be used for that. Case of a dairy situation, it would be much similar for hogs. They use different kinds of facilities; they can be deep pits, they can be scrape alleys, they can be (inaudible), but the truth of it is, a lot of it is going to be tied up in waste control facilities which may or may not be part of the permitting process. So it doesn't fit very well for me to support this. The reality is, these need to be connected and I oppose it, Senator Chambers. Now, I'm open to questions.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do I have time left because I had yielded some time to...I think. Did I yield time to Senator Wehrbein?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I think that was on my own time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, that was on his own time he said. Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you are next. I'm sorry I didn't make that clear. You're next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I was confused. I fell prey to Senator Bourne's syndrome, except that I'm not quite as young.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You're excused.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. I deeply appreciate that. Senator Wehrbein, when we were dealing with that bill that talked about the mandatory granting of these permits to come into compliance with a law, we allowed an increase in the number of head of cattle and dairy cattle, dairy cows, for the specific purpose of allowing a way to set off against the increased costs of coming into compliance. Do you remember that?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.
