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address how the bill might be working and really to see if there is, and how deep of a problem that we have in the state. I did want to share with you a speech that was given by the National...at the National Foundation for Women Legislators annual conference by Dr. Paula Dobriansky, who is the Under Secretary of State for Global Affairs. And she stated, there is no way for federal prosecutorial resources to catch all the trafficking cases that exist in the states. States are in a better position to fully grasp the domestic trafficking problem and take steps to end this affront to freedom in America. And she continued that state legislators are in the best position to assess the local trafficking problem and tailor ways to help victims and deter and punish traffickers. And I fully believe that this is what this amendment does, and I again thank Senator Chambers for working on it and would certainly ask your support for this issue. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Further discussion on the Chambers amendment? Senator Fischer, followed by Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR FISCHER: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Would Senator Synowiecki yield to some questions?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Synowiecki, would you yield?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes.

SENATOR FISCHER: Senator, I have some questions about the main bill itself, if you could answer those, please. We're asking for \$750,000 for the next two years, correct?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes, \$750,000 start-up and some sustaining funds, yes.

SENATOR FISCHER: What is this money going to be used for?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Senator Fischer, right now we have one prostitution-specific provider in the state, and its the WELLSRING program, run by Salvation Army, one program. And as I have been navigating through this bill and becoming educated
