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an opportunity to provide funding for specific prostitution treatment. And those involved with this, Senator Fischer--and I don't pretend to be an expert, and she smiles...

SENATOR BOURNE: Time. Thank you, Senator Synowiecki, Senator Fischer. Senator Wehrbein, you're next to speak.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I'd like to ask Senator Stuhr a question or two, please.

SENATOR BOURNE: Senator Stuhr, would you yield?

SENATOR STUHR: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I'll go back to your amendment, Senator Stuhr, thank you. I...how is this, your report system...I was looking at the last page, Section 12: The Attorney General and the Department of Health, on the reporting of possible child trafficking, are they...is there someone there, probably the Department of Health and Human Services, going to collect reports from sheriffs or of law officials, or will they pick up on caseworkers? I mean, what's the mechanics of the intent of your amendment, and I could ask Senator Chambers, too, also, but...

SENATOR STUHR: Right. I don't know exactly what the mechanics will be, but we felt it was very necessary that there be some, you know, some follow-up. And when we introduced the bill, there were a number of people that testified in regards, and thought that we should have some follow-up, you know, to determine.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, I'm wondering where this information is going to be collected, because as I read the report, where are they going to get their data from, if you will, to make their report about what's going on? I don't know if that...maybe that's being done now. I don't know whether law enforcement has a line for this, so to speak, or...

SENATOR STUHR: We are not sure, because we are sort of plowing
