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judges who will convict and sentence when they ought not. They can look at the arrests made by local police and sheriffs. So a lot of the problems in law enforcement are caused by law enforcers, and there is nobody, I repeat nobody, underlined, who will call law enforcement persons to account. It became the job of the U.S. Supreme Court, divided as it was, with the new Chief Justice on the wrong side, where I expect him to be on most things, John Roberts, that if police come to a house without a warrant and one person says they can search and another says they cannot, then they cannot. And right away the cops, the ones who claim to be upholders of the law, started screaming and hollering like hogs with their noses stuck under gates, and the reply was simply this: One person cannot waive or annul the constitutional rights of another person. If one fool is willing to give up his or her rights, that fool does not have the authority to take away the rights of another person when those rights are protected under the constitution. So being the wily seekers after unlawful authority that the law enforcement establishment are, they brought up the matter of domestic violence and said they could not deal with those situations, and the court handled that quickly, as the court should have. Fortunately, when the court does the right thing, it is good that law enforcement does not have its way at the level of the U.S. Supreme Court that it does in the state of Nebraska, in the city of Omaha where people's rights can be violated with impunity and there is no place to go for redress, no place; not to the FBI, which has an office in Omaha; not to the chief of police, who happens to be a Negro chap whom I call the "Chef," because he's more of a cook for white people than he is a chief who exercises the authority of that office to make sure these white officers behave when they come in marauding in the black community. So when I look at these kinds of activities involving counties, inmates, and how inmates are treated and mistreated, I don't have any sympathy for these counties. Basically, I feel a contempt that I try to keep concealed most of the time. I'm not going to vote against what Senator Brashear is offering here...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
