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SENATOR CUDABACK: And you're recognized again, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, I recognize this is only intent language and the only way that it might be honored is if a Governor is seated who will agree to instruct the Department of Corrections to comply with this. Would you agree with that?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: So stipulated.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who do you think is going to be the next Governor, or would you rather keep that close to the vest?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: Yes, I'm not, at this hour of this day, I don't want to affect this agenda, so I'll keep it close to the vest.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. I asked the first time who do you think. Now I'll ask who do you want to be the next Governor? (Laughter) Let me ask it...

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: At this hour of this day, I don't want to affect this agenda and I'll also keep that close to the vest.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you could choose between any of those who are running and me, who would you rather have be Governor? Who, before you answer, who is in a position to affect today's agenda, the three who are running or me?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: Don't tempt me in your favor, Senator Chambers. We've worked together a long time and I appreciate it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Very good answer. Thank you, Senator Brashear. Here's why I'm going after this in the way that I am. The Department of Corrections does not have to honor this. If, however, it is honored and we get all of this information, there is nothing here that requires the Legislature to do anything, and that's why I'm not going to oppose it. And if we get some information, what we might realize is that counties are padding
