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these amounts to try to make money off this operation, as some used to do with what was called the Indian bounty bill before I got rid of it. And the way that operated, they got, the jailer, got so much for each day for the meals for each inmate, so if they're in Thurston County they would pick up a Native American a few minutes before midnight, let him out a few minutes after, serve no meals and charge for two days' meals. That's the dishonesty of the sheriffs. And they had one up there named Clyde Storie and he had a way of bullying people. I didn't understand why people were afraid of him. When I heard how scared the senators were, and they said Clyde Storie is coming, and senators were running under tables and hiding behind chairs, so I expected them to have to widen the door and some hulking monstrosity would hunch down even more than he was, shoulders swelled up around his head, hair growing down his neck, his back, and sticking out through his sleeves. So I don't hear any loud heavy footfalls like those of a giant. The door opens and I don't see the light blotted out by a huge frame. There's a little bitty short guy walking in, and that was Clyde Storie. He had a pinched face, mouth that looked like it was drawn with a pencil, and his eyes were so close together you could take one finger and stick it in both of them at the same time, and that was the man they were afraid of, and he was very incensed that I was going to get rid of his bounty. But he knew in me that he had somebody who was not going to run under a table, hide behind a chair, but would deal with him any way he chose to deal. And I did remind him I'm not a Native American whom you can put in jail and mistreat; I'm your even change. And he wound up getting a job as a truck driver somewhere in Florida. So there are things that happen in these counties which are illicit and they are not called to account by anybody.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, as Senator Schmit used to say, this is a proposal that doesn't hurt anybody, it doesn't help anybody, it doesn't cost anything, it doesn't do anything, so the Legislature ought to feel comfortable in voting for it. Thank you, Mr. President.
