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know what, at least you've got 12 months to figure it out from here on out. You know, you've got 12 more months to figure out how you're going to put together a drug task force. In today's day and age, we have caps on city government and what they can assess, you know, on property taxes. We have caps on everybody, the county. We've got limitations to control spending. And you want to control all the spending at the sheriff's department, but you also want your cake and eat it too, because you want meth arrests. You want people...you want those drug dealers across the street arrested. Well, you discontinue this funding, you get what you had 15 years ago, and that's a police officer, knocks on the front door, doesn't have probable cause, doesn't see anything, doesn't make an arrest, because they don't have a warrant. And they don't have a warrant because they don't have the information to put in the document and the pleading to the judge. You want criminal investigation, you want drug prosecution, you have to pay for it. And that means build your case, take it to the judge, get a warrant that meets the constitutional parameters in our criminal court system and the rights that we all have as Americans, and then let the law enforcement officers go to that drug house, make the arrest, and send the guy that's been giving 15-year-olds meth to prison. Send the guy that is causing problems in families across Nebraska to jail. You get rid of this funding, you go back 15 to 20 years, and you get the occasional bust. You don't get any coordination, you don't get any planning. You walk up to the front door, you knock a couple of times, you don't see anything that can lead to an arrest for the sale or manufacture of methamphetamine, you walk home, and you call the people that live next-door and you say, I'm sorry, we couldn't make an arrest. Drug enforcement requires undercover work. Drug enforcement requires a long-term commitment. Drug enforcement requires building a case that a prosecutor can use in court. Drug enforcement with the Byrne funding talks about getting the big fish, the guy that's making the meth, or bringing it into town, or dealing it out to a bunch of mules...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FLOOD: ...that are basically selling it. You vote no on AM2699 and you get what we had 20 years ago, and that's,
