SENATOR BROWN: Senator Stuhr, one other question: Do you sing?

SENATOR STUHR: Do I sing? Occasionally.

SENATOR BROWN: Would you like to sing for a while

to...(laughter)

SENATOR STUHR: Sing for my supper? No.

SENATOR BROWN: Well, to make up some time so that we can get this amendment, for the other bill that's before us, in place.

SENATOR STUHR: How about you? Do you sing? (Laughter) That might be a better...

SENATOR BROWN: It's your bill, it's your bill.

SENATOR STUHR: That might be a better question.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank...are you finished, Senator Brown?

SENATOR BROWN: Thank you, yes.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senators Brown and Stuhr. Senator Friend, you're recognized to speak. Senator Friend. Senator Friend waives. Senator Landis, you're recognized.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. As scintillating as I find LB 690A, and far be it for me to interrupt the kind of dialogue that we're having that is at the cutting edge of public policy, I just wanted to take a moment to announce that tonight is the opening night of Macbeth, called the Scottish play by those in the theater because of the alleged curse that accompanies saying that name on the theater, at the Haymarket Theater down in the Haymarket area of Lincoln.
