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work in unison in different groups, multiagency efforts, to combat the drug problem and enforce our drug laws in Nebraska. Four hundred and twenty-eight thousand dollars is the total. Senator Chambers and I have arrived at a compromise of sorts, and it goes like this. Of the \$428,000 that would have been spent under Senator Pederson's amendment earlier this afternoon, \$353,000 of that would be made available to law enforcement agencies that are located in counties other than counties that have more than 400,000 people. Obviously, if you look at the intent here, law enforcement agencies across the state can apply to the Crime Commission for grants, if you are in any county except Douglas County, to be part of the \$453,000 (sic). Now, you might say, what about the rest of the money, if we were going to spend \$428,000? In an effort to recognize the fact that Omaha still has a number of needs in its law enforcement community, we have set aside \$75,000 of General Funds as well that would be made available in a grant program to law enforcement agencies located in a county that has more than 400,000 residents or citizens, the intent being here, obviously, Douglas County, for the purpose of funding programs that help law enforcement agencies in this county with minority recruitment and, equally as important, diversity sensitivity training. That would be the compromise that we have worked out with Senator Chambers and others from the Omaha area. Now, we have talked to the folks in Omaha. They recognize that, you know, the two programs that we have identified are important. In Douglas County, at least we talked to the Omaha Police Department representative that's here in the Legislature, and they were comfortable with the compromise. This does two things. It allows the efforts in the rural areas in any county other than, essentially, Douglas to be able to continue receiving funding for the Byrne grants. It helps in our largest county, obviously, by funding programs that are important to the Omaha Police Department, like diversity training and minority recruitment of police officers. Three hundred and fifty-three thousand for everybody except Douglas County, plus \$75,000 for Douglas County, equals \$428,000. This is an effort to reach a compromise and still make sure that Douglas County receives important funding for programs that they want and that they think are important. And I can tell you, we talked to Jack Cheloha, and he listed some of the priorities of the police
