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quite detailed. And after a few days, the attorneys from the Omaha Public Schools responded. Your letter notes that the board placed...that the note that the board placed on the agenda of the matter of student assignment plan and states the allegation is that pursuant to this agenda item, OPS discussed the One City, One School plan in executive session. And then they give the dates. And this...I'm just paraphrasing parts of this. There was no plan to reorganize school districts ever discussed by OPS board of education...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Pahls.

SENATOR PAHLS: ...on the three dates. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You may continue.

SENATOR PAHLS: Thank you. There...on these...on the dates, on March 7 and March 21 of 2005, they basically discussed the impact of the city of Omaha annexation of the city of Elkhorn, and they also discussed the repeal of the statute 79-535. And it continues on. In addition, information on how the combination of the issues discussed that were coupled with several actions taken by the Legislature also impact the organization of the school districts in the Omaha area was discussed. If you read...and I'm going to...if you want the total letter, what you need to do is go to KETV.com. They have all the letters on their web site. The part that I thought was very interesting, providing further detail on the nature of the legal advice provided to the OPS board of education in the executive sessions in question to the Attorney General's Office, which is defending state officials in the school funding suit, is simply inappropriate. I think these are, again, just indications why this open meetings law, that we need to take a serious look at that. And you can see why the public has a question on the transparency of government. If we are going to make major decisions, we need to be fair about that. And here's one final section that I need to read from the World-Herald. Larry King, executive director of the World-Herald, said, it is clear that OPS officials wanted to keep the subject of taking over suburban schools secret from the public.
