SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you. I will ask Senator Connealy, Mr. President, if I may.

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Connealy, would you respond, please?

SENATOR CONNEALY: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Connealy, do you know how much money that amendment generated for the State Fair?

SENATOR CONNEALY: \$2 million so far.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And does it look like it will be at least that much for ongoing years?

SENATOR CONNEALY: Yes, it will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And people don't show any inclination to slack off their playing of the lottery. Is that (inaudible)?

SENATOR CONNEALY: Well, lottery revenues have been down to some extent, but this is in the payouts, so it will stay where it is.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm not a friend of the State Fair to the extent of wanting to amend the constitution, which I fought against, voted against, but the Legislature did it anyway. The State Fair, by everybody's reckoning, had fallen on hard times. The public was not attending. Buildings apparently were ramshackle and not being maintained. So "Emperor" Walt Radcliffe was retained to work with Senator Landis to buffalo the Legislature into giving the State Fair Board 10 percent of the lottery funds every year. Their "bamboozlement" was successful. That money is going to the State Fair, and they don't need this checkoff. I'd like to ask Senator Kremer a question.

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Kremer, would you respond, please.

SENATOR KREMER: Yes, I will.
