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probably a lot longer than mine. But if he used the checkoff, that's fine. So we've...Senator Chambers, we've held up other bills in here, and why should this one be any different? This is up to your discretion what you want to do with it. But I will support this, because I think it's the right thing to do. Thank you.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, all I heard was Senator Janssen's last comment that something was the right thing to do. So I would like to ask him a question.

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Janssen, would you respond, please.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Certainly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, what was it that you said was the right thing to do?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I said that some people think it's the right thing to do. I didn't use the checkoff personally, but apparently a lot of other people did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, if you had a bill that meant something to you, and somebody else put an amendment on it which had really nothing to do with what your bill was aimed to accomplish...let me turn it around. Somebody else had a bill, you added an...you offered an amendment, and your amendment would possibly carry that person's bill down. Would you leave your amendment on and jeopardize that person's bill? Or what would you do?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, it all depends on whether I felt that strongly about the bill, or if I felt as though the amendment that was placed on it was a good amendment, even though it was going to be debated very lengthy. And I thought it was the right thing, why, you know, I would support that. You know, we have this happen a lot in here, Senator Chambers. You know
