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that, and you're very instrumental in doing that most of the time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you know what I have seen, Senator Janssen? Senators would take their amendment off. I helped Senator Burling when he had a bill that meant something to him.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: People were offering amendments, and I suggested to them that they ought to leave Senator Burling's bill alone, that he had a gazelle for a bill, and they were trying to put an elephant on it, and is that what he wanted? Well, he didn't want his bill to go down, so I fought those amendments, and they were withdrawn.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brown was going to offer an amendment to a bill yesterday to add venture capital. It ran into opposition. She did not jeopardize Senator Wehrbein's bill. Now that Senator Cudaback has returned, that's all I will ask you. Thank you, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'd like to renew my discussion with Senator Cudaback, Mr. President.

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Cudaback, would you respond, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Cudaback, did you have a bill dealing with old-time vehicles, and that bill meant something to you?

SENATOR CUDABACK: It did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And did I offer some amendments which did help improve the bill to some extent?
