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know, that would be another...that would be a gray area in this area.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Flood.

SENATOR FLOOD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. I appreciate that, and you may be...you know, you're a lot more familiar with water issues...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FLOOD: ...in this state than I am. I guess the remedy that another litigant...that another state has against us is federal court, and when we start talking about, you know, the damages, I don't know that we would have to have the director of the Department of Natural Resources working on that number, if in fact it did exist from the compact, and there was a formula to...agreed-upon formula, it may be a different situation. I understand what you're saying about the fact that depletion is going to be a matter-of-fact issue; it's going to be stipulated, essentially, by agreement by the three states that participate, you know. Maybe we should reform that a little bit to suggest that, and then before we get into something like this, let's find a way to agree upon the damages from any depletion, not just for another state's benefit, for our benefit, as well, so that we can understand what another state would owe us, in the event that we had a similar situation. But I'll come over and talk to you some more about it. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Flood. Senator Langemeier.

SENATOR LANGEMEIER: Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, stand in opposition to AM2936, and I'm curious if Senator Schrock would yield to a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, would you yield?
