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where he could set up these courts and just do like he wanted to with reference to foreign people who are accused of being terrorists, all of that may go out the window. There has developed a notion of super or hyper secretiveness to which governmental operations are entitled. And I don't feel that way. Government should be transparent. Behind the guise of protecting public or homeland security, all kinds of abuses, in my opinion, have occurred already. Now to ask you the question. Is there a possibility with the approach that I'm suggesting that maybe some language could be crafted that would do away with just a blanket exemption for everything this group would do?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That was a long question, Senator Chambers. (Laugh)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, the question was short; the rationale was lengthy.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: My answer is going to be very brief.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I'm open to the idea. I need to talk to the administration who suggested this language in the first place, the policy group.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And want secrecy so they can hide all kind of corruption and wickedness and so forth.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, now, I'm not going to attribute those kinds of motivations here. I would just like to have that discussion, but I'm very open to it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that's why I'm not going to offer an amendment on General File.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I just want to alert you and the administration or whoever else has an interest. How much time
