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children with the responsibilities of adults. There are children trying harder to carry those responsibilities and discharge them, to a greater extent than some adults. The amount we're talking about is piddling. We know that it is. And if people weren't so beholden to business and blinded...maybe because they have jobs or are looking for jobs after they leave here. We need to be able to think about those who cannot speak for themselves, who cannot help themselves. These businesses are never going to do the right thing voluntarily. We set policy. The reason I wish Senator Foley was here, because he understands, even though he doesn't act on it a lot of times, the concept of social justice as preached by the Catholic Church. Even the Jesuits preach social justice, the society being fair to those people who cannot protect themselves, and there ought to be a standard below which no member of society is allowed to fall. And we come to this floor and you all have this preacher up here every morning, every morning.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then it comes to something like this, and your Jesus told you to look out for the least of his brothers and sisters. That's why I say there's nothing to it. I have more compassion in the tip of my little finger without Jesus than you all got in your whole body with the Father, Son, and the Holy Ghost. I don't need the big three telling me that when there are people struggling to make it, that something ought to be done to give them a hand. This that Senator Beutler has offered is not going to bust any business, any business. And if we have these children having to go to work where they make no money, why should they feel that working is the way to do anything or get anything, because you spend all that time there, you work hard, and you don't have anything to show for it? And then it's easy for somebody to come and whisper in their ear and say, look, you don't have a choice. If you were making enough money to support yourself...is that it?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.
