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where that might be true in the sense that if you have a higher minimum wage you tend to attract a larger labor pool. One of the problems we have in Nebraska is we don't have any laborers. You attract a larger labor pool, some types of businesses feel more comfortable coming to your state because they know they can get workers. So there are all kinds of trade-offs here that are hard to understand and to be sure about. I understand, from the votes, that obviously, as a body, we're right on the edge of this. I understand that I need to work with some of you to moderate this a little bit. Hopefully you can find it in your minds to do something significant here. At 4:30 we're scheduled to move on to other bills, so what...I assume we will not come back to this today. And what I pledge to you is that I will go to people, and if any of you want to come to me and make suggestions, but we'll work on something related to younger workers and hopefully we can get it in a shape that you're a little more comfortable with. So with that, I don't know if I need to put my light on again. Are there other lights on, Senator Cudaback?

SENATOR CUDABACK: There are not.

SENATOR BEUTLER: There are not? Well, I may have to read you...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Cunningham, your light is on now, Senator Cunningham.
