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oldest child within a family unit is not eligible to pursue a university education whereby his or her younger siblings are eligible to attend our university system at state...the in-state tuition rate simply because of the fact that the younger kids were born here, and the older kids, who had nothing to say about it, were brought here by the folks, by the parents, and they are essentially locked out of a university education, whereas his younger brothers and sisters can attain or can enroll at our university system. You know, I just think this is an issue of basic fairness. This is not an immigration issue. I think we need to look at this; that we're strapped with this. We're tasked with this because of the failure of the federal government, and we need to develop sound policy that is fundamentally fair. Want to thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Schimek, if you'd like the balance of my time, I'd yield.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, about 1, 30.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you very much, Mr. President and Senator Synowiecki. You just actually said some of what I was going to say in closing, and that is that birth order and parentage should not determine a child's future. Support for this proposal is growing among interested parties, and when I get a chance to talk again I want to go over some of these groups that are supporting this bill. But many thoughtful people have come to realize that these students really do mean a lot to our communities and economies. The Board of Regents recently voiced its support for the concept embodied by the bill and actually the bill itself. The Gallup Organization endorsed LB 239 last year in a letter to the Education Committee, which is included in Section 5 of your handout. Other groups from the education community, the religious...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...communities, and Hispanic communities worked together during the interim to solidify support for this issue. This is an issue which needs resolution. It is timely (laugh), I guess it's timely, and it is important to the future of these students. We've already let too many of them dangle
