SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Preister. Senator Smith, followed by Senator Aguilar and 13 others.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Would Senator Schimek yield to some questions?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, would you yield to a question from Senator Smith?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Senator Schimek. You mentioned that the parents of these children who are illegal immigrants pay taxes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR SMITH: I assume you're speaking of sales taxes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I'm speaking of sales taxes; in some cases, I think, income taxes, frankly, Senator.

SENATOR SMITH: So we know for a fact that they're paying income tax, even though they're undocumented?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I can't speak to that. I'm no expert in that area. I don't know that. I can't tell you what percentage of them are, but, yes, I'm sure that some of them are probably paying income taxes.

SENATOR SMITH: Okay. What is the standard practice right now? When do we learn that a student is ineligible for in-state tuition? How do we become aware of that?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, that's a good question, and it's my understanding that when a student enrolls...and, incidentally, Senators Foley and Friend, I think I gave you different information the other day and I need to correct it for you as well as to put it in the record. It's my understanding that when a student applies at the university, and I'm assuming at the other colleges as well, they are asked for a Social Security
