neither am I, but...okay. And I appreciate your candor. If you require them to begin the process of naturalization at the earliest possible time, and if that's either 18 years of age or...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: When they become eligible.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR ERDMAN: ...when they become eligible--which, again, they have to have gotten here lawfully under current law to begin this process of filing the application--then they'll never get to a point, under this situation, where they're here legally to be able to be employed. Is that accurate?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, you have me at a disadvantage because I'm not real familiar with all of that. I can't...I'm not...I can't attest to whether they can't apply until they've been a legal resident or been a resident lawfully entering the country. I don't know that.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Okay. And, Senator, Senator...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Some of them will be eligible because their parents...

SENATOR ERDMAN: Sure, I understand that, and I have a few seconds. I'll...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I'm sorry.

SENATOR ERDMAN: ...plan determine...I'm sure we won't stop after one round, but I'm reading you federal law, so I'm learning as we're going. And I'm not...like I said, I wasn't trying to spring this on you, but I am trying to learn because I have a passionate friend out here that has sent us all a letter, and I have visited with her, and my comment to her was...
