that are having a very difficult time going through the regular process. And I think we should have more deference towards them rather than those come in illegally, because to me, the word "illegal," I know they call undocumented, the word "illegal," to me, is illegal, no matter how you want to spell it or how you want to say it. If you break a law, you break a law. And if they're not here legally, they're here illegally, so that's the way I look at it as far as the parents are concerned. And again, I feel for the children, but I am concerned about their parents not being legal and they're not trying to become legal, and that's creating a huge problem. Like the situation in California, how many countries would that work when you have 500,000 illegal immigrants protesting out there because of the rights and so forth, and illegal is still illegal? I just can't understand that. If they want to come in, I...more than welcome. We need those people. But we also need employers who will pay them the wages that they deserve. You know, like the President and so forth saying in Congress that they're taking jobs that our people will not work for. Well, the reason we won't work for that, because of the salaries. A lot of these companies, especially our packing companies, and I have one in my area, their salaries now are less than they were 15 years ago, so they're taking advantage of these people. I know it's better than what they've got in Mexico, but they are taking advantage of them up here. And our people will not work for that because it's not enough to support a family. I think Senator Preister mentioned that about...when we were talking about the minimum wage law. You have mother and father working, and between the two of them they don't make enough. Well, that's ten dollars and some odd cents an hour. Well, up at the packing houses, they don't start out at that. If they have any family at all, then they qualify for all our social programs, just like anyone else would, but that's because they're not being paid properly. So they are being taken advantage that way, too. So I think there should be more emphasis on penalizing employers for hiring illegal people. I know some...it's very hard sometimes to differentiate because it's so easy to get Social Security. I think up in our area for \$30 you can get a Social Security number. And a lot of them are driving without driver's license because that is more difficult to get because they do not have the documentation for that. So with
