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Synowiecki, I will be voting against this legislation, but you may have the rest of my time if you want to refute my remarks.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Hudkins. Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Hudkins, wheelchair lifts are taken out of the bill...out of the amendment. Did you know that? Everything you spoke to, everything you read from the League of Dignity is not a part of my amendment, AM2344. They're taken out. And I'll yield to Senator Hudkins.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Yeah, my...

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And they were taken out because this has been an ongoing process. I've been working with the industry for over two years now, invested an enormous amount of personal time into this bill, and this thing has evolved. It's been compromised. It's been looked at. And the paramount...the two things paramount--consumer protection, and safety--that's been my concern all the way long. And, quite frankly, I had a hard time giving up having them regulated, them personal chairlifts, because the first time somebody breaks their neck on one of them, there's going to be senators down here that's going to want to get them inspected. So it was a...that was a very hard sell to me, but in the art of compromise and wanting to work through this and work through these issues,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...they were taken out entirely.

SENATOR HUDKINS: If that's the case then, Senator Synowiecki, my mistake. I should have read the amendment a little more closely, and I'll listen to the rest of the discussion. Thank you. (Laughter)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hudkins. Senator Synowiecki, you're next. You may continue.
