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SENATOR CHAMBERS: And who is Thor on the legislative floor when it comes to ethanol? Let us hear it, Senator Baker. Who is that person?

SENATOR BAKER: Who? I think it's Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. So I am opposed to this. Senator Baker is not surprised. Senator Connealy is not surprised. I don't know whether Senator Synowiecki is or not. But I pay attention to what happens with reference to ethanol and I even notice where some investors and speculators in other parts of the country are suddenly thinking that maybe, as risky as it is, they may should jump into this ethanol thing and get these pinhead states like Nebraska to offer more in the way of incentives to give more incentive for these investors and speculators to get into this risky business, something which I oppose greatly as long as public money of any variety will go into subsidizing, propping up this sham of an industry. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time...thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. I made a promise to Senator Synowiecki that if this drug out at all, I would withdraw the amendment. It's not a great big deal. It would streamline some...the process a bit. But, you know, with the discussion we've had...and it seems like when we mention ethanol, and we've been through that process before, Thor is about to strike again here. But I'll just withdraw the amendment, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Senator Byars would move to amend, AM3000. (Legislative Journal page 1395.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Byars.
