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of that person who needs medical care but cannot pay for it? The person simply suffers, isn't that true, or finds a provider willing to give care without compensation, or the county will have to pay? Aren't those about the only options?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is correct, and that's not altogether different than what we have right now today.

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: There are certain...and I've got my light on. There are certain people that don't qualify for Medicaid, many that are poor, that are working poor, that cannot get services and they don't qualify for Medicaid, and so we have those right now. How can we better assist those?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But doesn't this also allow the reduction of services for some people, an increase in services for others who currently are eligible? All of them are eligible, and some will have their services reduced and others will have theirs increased. Isn't that true?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can that happen right now?

SENATOR JENSEN: It can, by following the procedure of current law.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Will it be easier to do if this bill becomes law?

SENATOR JENSEN: There would be, I think, more flexibility when the bill becomes law than we have today; however, we are giving more direction to the department than we are today.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What priority...

SENATOR BAKER: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh.
