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suggest that those services be covered, and we run into this all the time with...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But that doesn't mean they will be. Isn't that correct?

SENATOR JENSEN: Not 100 percent.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you...why do you put that word and this language in these findings? Are you merely restating the law? Or isn't it more accurate to say that all of this is designed to make it easier to increase costs to recipients and reduce benefits? Because throughout you're talking about being unable to meet the medical needs of people who genuinely have them and can't afford them. So you have to find a way to reduce costs, which means either increasing the amount that recipients pay or reducing the services, isn't that true, because there's no other way to decrease the cost, is there, or render some people ineligible who currently are, not just reducing services but denying services altogether to some people who currently would be deemed eligible? Isn't that true?

SENATOR JENSEN: You...yes, to a point.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Where is it not true?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, as we went through this, we did not want to reduce any services to anyone that needed those services. We didn't want to reduce the number of eligible...those who were eligible. We didn't want to reduce the...also any of the...or, we didn't want to increase copays, we didn't want to increase premiums.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, I hear what you're saying you didn't want to do, but tell me where we are at in terms of what is going to be done.

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, we're trying to provide a system that will cover as many people as possible with the dollars that are available.
