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SENATOR CHAMBERS: But that could mean covering none of them adequately.

SENATOR JENSEN: No. Well, adequately, you would have to describe what adequate is, I suppose.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Just like all these terms, correct? Let me ask you this one, because my time will run out. When we get to the top of page 2, continuing from the bottom of page 23 (sic) we're talking about eligible low-income Nebraskans, and listed are "children, pregnant women and families, aged persons, and persons with disabilities." Which of those would have the highest priority?

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Or, in a descending order, give me the rank order of these groups in terms of priority in the minds of these bureaucrats who are trying to save money.

SENATOR JENSEN: I wouldn't prioritize one over the other.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then how are you going to determine which will receive and which will be reduced, in terms of services?

SENATOR JENSEN: By direction that we would give them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I see, in line 6 on this same page 2, "policies and priorities must be established for the medical assistance program that will effectively address the health care and related needs of eligible recipients and effectively moderate the growth of medical assistance expenditures." If you're going to moderate the growth of expenditures, that means you're going to have less money available, and you establish priorities. And since these groups that are listed are the ones who are receiving the service, there has to be a rank order established, which is another way of saying priorities. But I want to know what those...

SENATOR BAKER: Time.
