SENATOR BROWN: Okay. I'm going to go out on a limb a little bit and say that...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you want to ask me which...if they're all equally situated, which of the four groups...how I would prioritize the groups, if that's what you were going to ask me.

SENATOR BROWN: No, I...

SENATOR BROWN: No, I was just asking because, to me, it does make a difference and I would go out on a limb to say that I would have a personal...be mostly concerned about the pregnant woman, because I think that children are the most at risk and often the poorest. But I will yield the rest of my time to you, Senator, to continue your conversations about this.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Brown. And I will do what I had asked Senator Jensen about but which he declined to do. But before I do that, I'm going to tell you a short little story. There was this very cruel potentate who liked to see people in a dilemma, so he brought this beautiful young woman before him and he said, your father is an aged person, but he's healthy. He can live maybe 20 more years. You have a husband, whom you love dearly. You've had four children with and by this man. You two have indeed become one flesh. Choose which one is going to live, your aged father or your beloved husband. So without hesitating, the young woman said let my father live. And the potentate said, why? She said, although I love both of them, one father only can I have. I can obtain another husband, maybe not of the quality of this one, but I can obtain another. Well, the potentate was one of those kind of people who liked cleverness. He said, because of your answer, neither your father nor your husband will die. That is my position.
