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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, thank you. So we're not in sync, are we, here? I've often thought and said, and I don't know whether I'm right, but I think we already have in many cases more technology, in this case health, but we have it in agriculture, we have it in business and everything else. We have more technology than I think we could ever hope to pay for. And I assume that based on what the discussion between Senator Chambers and others and Senator Kruse on the prioritization, we probably have de facto prioritization in many areas just because the money we're willing to spend. I think all of us want to avoid what that issue is and what that decision is. But I also go back to the thought that we started here probably an hour and a half ago when we said, can everybody be treated somewhat equal? In other words, you don't have the prioritization. And I think that's the value of not only this discussion but as I see this bill because it looks like to me if we all would pull together, and that's all of us and all Americans, if you will, and all soon-to-be Americans or want-to-be Americans, if we'd all pull together we probably could make it more affordable for all. And it's the little things to me that may work. It's a week less spent in the nursing home and spent in your home, all those little kinds of things that I think we ought...it would maybe make things more efficient. I don't know how you arrive at that. We can't do it as a dictatorship, but we can do it by discussion I think. As we watch what's unfolding in Florida as they try to rebuild down there, you wonder is everybody pulling their same weight to help that out or is there a dependency upon a few people to do it all? Is that the case in healthcare? Are we all pulling together or are we simply depending on somebody else to pull it out? I don't know the answer to any of those except I think we have to go back to the first premise that Senator Jensen said, it's not we cannot continue like we are fiscally. We cannot continue like we are fiscally. And so if there is going to be de facto prioritization, then we probably ought to at least have something to say about it...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...because it's going to occur whether we do anything actively or not. And I see great value in this bill and this amendment the way it was written. Perhaps it's not
