SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. The question is, shall the house go under call? All in favor vote aye; all opposed vote nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 mays to place the house under call.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: The house is under call. Would all members please return to the Chamber and check in? The house is under call. Would all unauthorized personnel please leave the floor? The house is under call. Would members please return to the Chamber? Senator Kruse is here. Senator Schrock. Senator Howard and Senator Cudaback. Okay, it looks as if all members are checked in and Senator Baker has authorized call-in votes.

CLERK: Senator Foley voting yes. Senator Kopplin voting yes. Senator Redfield voting yes. Senator Kruse voting yes. Senator Cornett voting yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 2 nays, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: The amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk, are there further amendments?
