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SENATOR LANDIS: Let me give you what I think is an example that you'd like to have, which was an example of that. Let's imagine...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I don't want an example. I want an answer. Yeah, because I answered yours yes, or no, or I don't know.

SENATOR LANDIS: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You really don't know for sure, do you? You don't have to know everything.

SENATOR LANDIS: That's fair enough, and I certainly don't.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR LANDIS: Just and common costs are available to be charged. They could be charged in Nebraska.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and that's...

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: If they're unreasonable, they can be excluded.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, my time is running. That's the only reason. If I had unlimited time, then I would continue. Members of the Legislature, I'm slow, but like the turtle, eventually, if we do this long enough, I'll get there. There are costs in other states that could affect the rates of Nebraska ratepayers, as far as Aquila's rate structure is concerned. Now the example that I gave about the Disney World I acknowledged in the beginning was outlandish, so I could focus on and spotlight what I was talking about. It can be shown, however, factually, that Aquila has made very bad business decisions. They've had to sell off four utilities. There is nothing to say they won't mess up in Nebraska, also. And even though you can talk about the Public Service Commission conducting some kind of fact-finding process,...
