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SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's what I thought.

SENATOR BOURNE: Yes, the Civil Commitment Board.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Heidemann.

SENATOR HEIDEMANN: Senator Cudaback, fellow members, I was wondering if Senator Bourne would yield to a couple comments, maybe a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bourne, would you respond?

SENATOR BOURNE: Certainly.

SENATOR HEIDEMANN: Looking at the fiscal note, I'm a little bit concerned in the out years. It looks like in '06-07, you're at \$6.1 million at cost, '07-08 it's \$7.2 million, and '08-09 at \$9.9 million. And then it looks like in '09-2010, it's stabilized at \$13.6 million. I was wondering if you think...is there any concern on your part to the cost in the out years and is there anything that you think that we could maybe do that would pare back that cost?

SENATOR BOURNE: I'm not sure. And I will tell you, Senator Heidemann, the A bill is coming next and, given how complex the civil confinement component is, I mean, we can talk about the fiscal component on the bill itself or if you wanted we could wait until the A bill is up next, whichever you would like. As far as extending it out into the future, you know, that's...we've worked with the Governor's Policy Research Office. We worked with HHS. I have asked them...and of course, their concerns were the same as yours and mine, to pare these costs back as much as absolutely is possible. I do believe that the numbers that you're talking about are an estimate. I don't know how accurate those numbers would be. I don't know what else I can say other than that.
