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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schrock. Senator Heidemann.

SENATOR HEIDEMANN: Senator Cudaback, fellow members, I was one that had some concerns and I actually voted for LB 1226 because I was told that it was going to cost \$10 million. I do agree with Senator Schrock that we probably will be back in future years because this problem is not going to go away, both for having not enough water, and having too much water when it comes to storm water. I do believe we'll be back. I do believe that we probably as a body will appropriate more money, but I just would feel a lot more comfortable that at this time that we have it somewhat of an intent of spending \$10 million and leaving it there. I will be here in future years. It's something that interests me a lot. I sit on Appropriations. Anything that costs money, you know, interests me. But I fully understand where you're coming from, but I am going to support AM3078 and I urge the rest of the body to do also. Thank you, would give the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Heidemann. Further discussion? Senator Wehrbein, followed by Senators Erdman, Fischer, Redfield, and Stuhr. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I am going to oppose the amendment. It makes sense, I know, in some minds to stop this and see how it works out, but we've been battling around the storm water issue for eight to ten years now. This is a first movement we've really had on trying to help. It would seem to me, those of you that are interested in property tax relief ought to be supporting this because it does...it does get into sales and income tax support statewide for something that I think we all have an obligation and responsibility for, regardless of where you're at. And as Senator Schrock said, there's 18 cities across the state and I think doesn't that number go up after awhile, Senator Schrock, may I ask? May I ask Senator Schrock?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock.
