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driving third offense conviction, and the fact that individuals that are confronting a DWI third, regardless of what they do, regardless if they're afforded probation or not, will lose their license for 15 years. I think Senator Pedersen, given his professional affiliation outside the Legislature, will tell you that regardless of what we do on the first and second offense, regardless of how much we raise these penalties, we're still going to have drunk driving third offense convictions in our state. We are going to have people come before the court for drunk driving third, because it's alcoholism, it's a problem, and they have not engaged themselves in recovery. And until and if they engage in recovery, they will keep coming back. Now, Senator Pedersen, I know you know this, because I know it, that the threat or that hammer of that 15-year license suspension provides an overwhelming incentive for individuals to engage in the treatment process and recovery. Time and time and time again, during my years as a probation officer, I've seen individuals literally turn themselves around, turn their lives completely around, make profound changes, make profound changes in their life. You want to know why? You know why they did that, is because of that 15-year license suspension hammer over their head, and the fact that they came to the realization that they needed to do something dramatically about their problem. And what we're doing here is taking an entire population of habitual drunk drivers...and I'm not--ask Senator Pedersen--I'm not here advocating drunk driving or anything. What I'm telling you is, members, you need to know what you're voting on here, in the sense that as a tool within our criminal justice system, and as a tool used by providers, substance abuse providers, we have what we call coerced treatment. And that is, coerced treatment is when an individual is essentially forced to subject themselves to the treatment process and the community...and community-based AA meetings, and then sort of recovery protocols and programs. And with this 15-year license suspension looming over an individual's head, you would not believe the life-changing aspects of these individuals that are facing that. And we...and quite frankly, we're going to lose that. We're going to lose that. We won't have that incentive. We won't have that motivator. What we're doing here on that...again, for these habitual offenders, we are providing a total and complete disincentive, because you know what? You're going to lose that
