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somewhere else at a cost that would probably be, as Senator Byars said, twice or three times as much in the private sector as what they would be at these centers. So I appreciate the fact the administration has said that, you know, this is one of the items that he really doesn't worry about the override. And I believe the body is willing to take this along with them. So I thank you very much for the time and I think we're doing the right thing here.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I rise in support of the override. It takes, I think...Senator Wehrbein, don't faint here. (Laughter) I'm not sure we have the doctor of the day ready. I try to look at things critically and look for dollars spent that are leveraged very well. And perhaps I can only speak from the experience of my local district, but I am a big fan of the concepts of the federally qualified health centers. I believe that they probably leverage the dollars better than any other agency, be it local, state, or federal. And for that reason, I think this is a modest dollar amount. And this vote isn't symbolic in nature, it's the actual dollars going to leverage other dollars. And I just see it as money well spent. And for that reason, I hope that you will join me in offering a green light in support of the committee recommendation. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Smith. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Thank you, Mr. President. I was wondering if Senator Pederson was available.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Pederson, would you yield?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I will.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Senator Pederson, as I look at the, as a status sheet, the vetoes that are before us are included in that as of right now, is that correct?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Yes.
