SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Howard's comments reminded me of the fact that the body had adopted my amendment which would give some additional money to the AIDS program. And I'm not totally unmindful of such things. And I was reminded that the Governor's veto did not touch that money. I'm pleased that it did not touch that money. But I'm displeased that so much other money was touched and we have chosen to do nothing about it. Senator Connealy has assumed responsibility and I applaud him for that and will support his motion to override. And as we consider that motion, we should do what the Governor purports to do. Look at the entire picture. Consider the total amount of the budget, the total amount that was stripped out by the Governor, over \$22 million, then the paltry amount contained in Senator Connealy's motion to override and the good that can be achieved through overriding that provision that Senator Connealy's motion will address. I genuinely get miffed when I see the Legislature treated with such disdain and the legislators accept it. It boggles my mind how some of you can get so irritated at what I merely say when you have the opportunity to stand up and counter anything that I say. But I have not deprived any of you of one penny. I have not taken the money from a program which the rest of your colleagues had voted to expend. The Governor does these things to you and you're grateful. He stuck a knife that's 16 inches long, he stuck 15.5 inches of that 16-inch knife in your back. And you said thank you, Mr. Governor, for not sticking that other half-inch of the knife in my back. And somebody else, a killjoy such as myself, says, well, what about the 15.5 inches? They say, well, since he pushed the 15.5 inches of blade through, he could have pushed all 16 and he didn't, so he's really a good guy. So things are relative. When you can convince a group of people that they're entitled to nothing and you take from them 98 percent of what they have and leave them 2 percent, why are they grateful?
