I have been in churches before, I don't go now, and I see stained-glass windows which can be considered artistic in nature because they depict scenes supposedly from the Bible, and some scenes that are just supposed to be restful. Some churches have murals on the walls. Others have paintings in frames that are hung on walls around the building. When you go in state capitol buildings all over this country, you see artwork. If you walk through those doors back there and look on the floor and look on the ceiling, you see artwork. Those are the things that say something about the people who were here, something about what they deem to be important. And there might be times when Senator Don Pederson will talk to young people about the value of art, when maybe even my good friend Senator Smith, when he's in Washington, looking at all that stellar artwork in the Capitol Building will talk about how inspiring it is.
