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don't, then on Select File, I'm going to do everything I can to tear up these two bills and tear up the rest of the session. I'm giving up a strategic advantage by allowing these two bills to move at this time. I'm doing something which I don't do down here. I'm trusting somebody. But the reason I'm trusting Senator Brashear is because I've worked with him in the past and I have a just basis to trust him. But you never know when somebody might go crazy. So I want him to know that I trust but I don't have a lot to say on this bill and I don't think people have paid attention to the explanations. Senator Brashear and Senator Landis are speaking for the record. I'm not going to have anything more to say on these two bills while they're on General File. So although I might temporarily sheathe a weapon, they don't want me to pull it back out and have to use it because if I do that, these two bills are not the only thing that I will be looking at. And that's all that I have to say. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, can I ask Senator Brashear a question, please?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, would you yield to a question from Senator Wehrbein?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President, I'll yield.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yeah, I was reading the bill and I was joking with you when I said I didn't trust you. But I do wonder, is there anything to do with eminent domain in this at all in terms of the new partnership that's created or anything?

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: I'm sorry, I didn't hear one word of your...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Is there anything to do with eminent domain or condemnation procedures...

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: No.
