SENATOR BOURNE: I don't believe they are because there is no law that sets them out similarly to what you have proposed in your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if they exist and the public schools drew them, that is state action, isn't it?

SENATOR BOURNE: I don't believe that the public schools, Omaha Public Schools, have drawn boundaries that segregate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But there are boundaries drawn by the public school system and if they segregate, that is official state action, isn't it, by the school?
