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a given district, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the boundaries, the criterion is the existing attendance areas for those high schools, correct?

SENATOR BOURNE: It talks about the areas surrounding either two or three of the high schools in a Class V district.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And it uses the term "attendance areas." Now, Senator Bourne, would this amendment that I offered require any child to no longer attend the school where he or she is attending now?

SENATOR BOURNE: Not as I read it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does the Legislature draw these district boundaries?

SENATOR BOURNE: Under your amendment, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No. It lays out criteria and a community board, or whatever that term is, will draw the boundaries. Then they submit them to the state entity which will ultimately have the responsibility to do this. So the Legislature is not...that's all I will ask you. I won't keep you on your feet and I don't want my time to run out. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Kruse may be having fun but I'm not doing this for fun. All of my children went to OPS and my grandchildren. I don't know where Senator Cornett's children go to school. But I know that, other than Warren Buffett, probably all of those white men who were lamenting what I'm trying to do to give some local control to the parents whose children go to these schools, I'll bet their children didn't go to public schools. They didn't have a black person, a Latino among their group when they're telling how racist the Legislature is. They have not even read the amendment. Otherwise, they would know...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that it is following what OPS has done. They did not lament the existence of segregation right now in
