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thought was right, but we said, whoa, whoa, whoa, time out; this is inappropriate; we need time; it could affect our economy adversely. But yet we're going to take two hours and we're going to dice up a school district in Omaha, the only Class V district we have? Possibly a little bit premature, folks, maybe. Senator Mines pointed out, you know, we're going to get sued. You can file suit for anything. We don't react to that mentality. I don't know if this is unconstitutional. Quite frankly, I'm going to take Senator Chambers' word for it. He's forgotten more about the constitution than I'll ever know.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FRIEND: And honestly, let's just pretend that it's constitutional for a second. Does that mean it's wise to do? Does that mean it's smart to do, after two hours of debate? Sometimes legislative action is not necessary, I think we all know that. I'm not...I'm going to vote to reconsider this. I didn't vote last time. I don't think we need to do anything, or I would say I don't know that I'm convinced that we have to do anything. And I would be more than happy to stay here till 11:59 arguing about this particular issue if it will make me feel more comfortable and it will make everybody else out here feel a little more comfortable. And then we can at least say, you know what, gosh, we got eight hours in or close. That would make me feel a little bit better.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR FRIEND: Now...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Louden, followed by Senator Howard and others.
