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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you respond?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Senator Chambers, since...trying to...I'm not familiar at all with the Omaha School Districts and where the schools are and that sort of thing. I would...I was wondering, on your amendment now, as they say, you divide it up in three different school districts. Are those separate school districts or are those three school districts that would still be underneath the same superintendent umbrella and still be considered the Omaha Public School system?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They would be individual districts.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Then each one of you would put in for your own state aid, you'd put in...and that sort of thing, have your own mill levies and that and (inaudible) like that?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There is existing legislation that governs reorganization of a school district and all of those factors would come into play.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Okay. Then if your district in your area has more influx of poverty students and eligible for more state aid, then you would be able to go ahead and apply for it through the school formula and receive your state aid probably more accordingly than some of the other districts that were divided up?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Whatever the formula requires or allows is what would be done in each district, based on the demographics.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Okay. And then you would vote in your own school boards and hire your own superintendents and that sort of thing?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, and establish the curriculum.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Yes. Okay. Now at the present time in the
