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listen to you and I'm listening to you today. But I'm telling you, Senator Chambers has intrigued me. And again, I'm saying the information that I did read earlier was not mine. I'm not railing on the OPS school system. In fact, when I taught classes for UNO, I was defending Omaha unbelievable, more so than some of the people who attended it. And getting to the dollars, right now, if you're a child in need in OPS, you would get about \$8,500. Now if those children in need, if that money is concentrated more in that area, that money would go up to about \$9,700. There would be more money for people to develop a school system. The unique thing about this is that additional money would go to the right place. It would not be spread over 45,000 children. You will...it will be more concentrated. So there is a uniqueness there that I like. And do I have much more time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One, twenty-six.

SENATOR PAHLS: Okay. Here, I'm just going to read a couple excerpts from the transcript, February 13, 2001, was LB 513, and I'm just going to read a couple of them because these are not my words. I'm not speaking from the emotional aspect, although I do have some of that. I'm using the words that the individuals here who happened to speak, and I'm telling you, if you'd read this...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR PAHLS: ...you would hear the voice, and for those of you who are dealing with writing, voice is one of the six traits that you look for. Don't take the decision-making process out of the hands of the people, of the parents who kids...or children go to that school, and give it to the school board or to the superintendent because the history bears out that they're not really concerned about a segment of the children who are not in that school district. It is only when they are in...desirous of more money that you start seeing reports on poverty, disadvantaged children. There are lots of phrases like that in this. This is from somebody who testified in front of them. Here's another thing: I'm saying that we have to be able to sit down and plan as a community, because if we make up to
