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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: ...for the horses, for everything that is involved in it, the rooms, the restaurants, everything like that. But like I said, the live meet doesn't generate enough to keep it going. But the simulcasting part of it, which is run throughout the year then of races on other tracks that are being run, that generates the money to take care of it. I feel that if we could add this one more component to it for historic racing, it would really benefit the tracks. It's not expanding the gambling. We have the gambling already. And for the people that oppose gambling, I respect that. But we do have gambling and we do have races. We've got live races, simulcasting, and we're just trying to expand another part of it. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Further discussion on the motion to bracket? Senator Jensen, followed by Senator Kremer.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Here we do have another opportunity to separate individuals from their money. And you can call it horse racing, you can call it whatever you want to. But it does look like a slot machine, it sounds like a slot machine, and so it must be close to a slot machine and...because you're sitting there and you put your \$10 in and then you can go ahead and do whatever you want. You know, it's interesting. I pulled up this from the Internet. Actually, this is ESPN horse racing, talks about Oaklawn and offering a new type of racing. I'll just read to you from this. Oaklawn general manager invented a game called instant racing, sort of a merger of slots and horse racing. The idea is to give the gambler what so many want these days, dumbed down instant action, dumbed down instant action. The instant racing machines look a lot like a slot machine but patrons actually gamble on random unidentifiable races run in the past. Because the races have already been run and are stored in a video library, the customer can bet on as many races as she wants and have them run in succession. Yes, I understand there's a two-minute pause there. I really don't think that we need this. We had a bill and we went to the voters about
