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here or not, actually, would it?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, if you'd go back 40 years when there were a lot more horse races run in this state...well, as long as we're talking about this and killing time, Senator Chambers, we might as well look at everything, don't you agree? Don't you agree?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Absolutely, but you're going so far back in history, but go ahead, because you're making a point.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, because there were more horses, there were more racetracks, there were more people...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...attended the races at that time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Stuthman, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I've given about all the information that I have, except a few things about how much dollars it generates for the state, and it's from the Horsemen's Park in Omaha, which generates \$50 million in betting, and the state revenue from that portion of it, because of that amount of betting, wagering, is about \$700,000. The other tracks do not wager that many dollars, so they do not...are not taxed. But I think with this part of it, and hopefully we can work it out some time in the future, you know, it can be dealt with by the Racing Commission if they want to tax...have a state tax on these machines. I think that can be done. So that's all the comments I have at the present time, and I would just like to give a little bit of my time to Senator Synowiecki, if he would like to have some of my time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Synowiecki.
