it provides technical language on restrictions as far as the residents of the district; but also allows provisions to allow for the part-time enrollment of students who are not residents of such school districts, again, that is permissive; and further clarifies the language in the committee amendment to match current state law in other sections. I would encourage your support of AM3232.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Erdman. You've heard the closing on AM3232. The question before the body is, shall that amendment be adopted to the Education Committee amendments? All in favor vote aye; opposed vote nay. We're voting on the adoption of the Erdman amendment, AM3232, which amends the committee amendments to LB 821. Have you all voted on the question who care to? Record please, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on the adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The motion was successful. The amendment has been adopted.

CLERK: I have nothing further pending to the committee amendments.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Back to discussion of the committee amendments, AM2314, to LB 821. Senator Flood.

SENATOR FLOOD: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I just want to touch on one point that I think is important with regard to Senator Erdman's bill. As I understand it, and I will verify with Senator Erdman here in a second, to clear up some confusion for those of you that I've talked to, this does not affect, as I understand it, or have anything to do with the rights of homeschooled kids and their right to participate in extracurricular activities. And I say that because I do think that if you participate in an extracurricular activity at a public school, that you should meet the academic requirements to participate. And, Senator Erdman, if you would yield to a quick question, so I can lay this to rest and move forward.
