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of the loaf because I took my crumb this year in the Heidemann amendment. I also don't want that to happen. So I'm watching and listening very carefully and I'm trying to decide, with my head and my heart and all the wisdom I can muster,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Combs.

SENATOR COMBS: ...because I'm not sure the real mother is going to be able to come forward.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Combs. (Visitors and doctor of the day introduced.) Senator Synowiecki, followed by Senator Bourne and others.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature. Is Senator Raikes available for a question? I would appreciate a dialogue. Senator Raikes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Raikes, would you respond?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Senator Raikes, relative to what is the Chambers amendment and the division of the administrative authority over the high schools within the Omaha...what is now the Omaha Public School boundaries, I understand Senator Chambers, and I premised my remarks yesterday, I understand that any youngster within the city can attend any high school, even with the adoption of the Chambers amendment. But what is going on currently, our current status relative to the integration issue is that, from my understanding, from information received from Omaha Public Schools, is that one out of every two high school student, one out of every two attends a high school outside of their attendance area high school. Isn't that correct, Senator Raikes?

SENATOR RAIKES: I think that is correct, Senator.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay. Senator Raikes, here's...while I appreciate Senator Chambers' ingredient within his amendment that any youngster can go to any high school, once the
