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cloture.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: The bill will move on, and most of us in here do not even know what's in the bill. And I think we should start asking questions about what is in the underlying bill, LB 1024, with the Chambers amendment because, frankly, even though I will vote for the reconsideration motion, I'm not sure Senator Cornett has the votes to repeal this or to take out the Senator Chambers amendment. But I think we need to start examining whether or not LB 1024, on the whole, is the best I listened with interest to Senator Stuhr when she talked about she's tired of the spending on the...of lawyers and lobbyists, but I'll tell you what. If LB 1024 goes forward, you will see more money spent on lobbyists. I think what we need to do is what Senator Brashear advocated for last night. I think we need to take some time. I think we need to obtain a commitment from both parties that nothing will happen. will be no additional lawyer fees spent for 90 days, or whatever it was that Senator Brashear envisioned. Let cooler heads prevail. Let's take the emotion out of it. Let's slow down. Let's work through the summer and see what we can come up with.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator. Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Redfield, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. As we look at this issue, I hope that we can appreciate how important it is that we put to rest the mechanics, that we put to rest the idea of boundaries, that we put to rest who's fighting with who, who started what, and quickly get back to the quality of education for every child in this state. And I think that's where we are right now. We are hung up on a lot of other details that adults may care a lot about, but the children don't really care. They go to school in the morning. They're eager to learn. What are we going to be spending our time on? Are we going to be agonizing, as adults, as teachers, as administrators, as parents, as business leaders, about whether we're embarrassed? You know, I'm a parent. Every one of you who has been a parent has probably found a time in their life
