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we're doing here does not at all interfere with judicial discretion on a third offense, as is now, to suspend a license for 15 years and to deliver a rather substantial straight sentence jail time. The court reserves the discretion, rightfully so, under this proposed amendment if we return the bill, to suspend a driver's license for 15 years. I want to emphasize that. Secondly, fourth offense, there are no questions about it, you will receive a 15-year license suspension. Right now, there's a discretion afforded the court for that fourth offense. We remove that discretion. If you're a fourth offense drunk driver, you have displayed and exhibited habitual behavior, and there is no discretion accorded the court relative to the license suspension for a fourth offense. I do think we need that hammer on that third offense. I think regardless of what we do on the first and second offense, we will have a population of third offenders. And it's a public policy decision on whether or not you want to use that 15-year license suspension as a hammer to get these individuals into the treatment and recovery process and community AA meetings, or not. I think it's a bit punitive if we just do a blanket 15-year suspension. We will lose the attention of that population to the possible rehabilitative measures that are available to us, and to kind of steer that population toward recovery. I'll give the balance of the time back to Senator Friend.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Friend, a minute, thirty-five.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I think I misspoke earlier. I think I threw out the term two years. Obviously, that wasn't the case. From ten days in jail back to two days is what Senator Pedersen's idea was. Two days in jail sends a strict message. There's nothing on the books right now with a high BAC on first offense. We are creating this penalty, and after my conversations with Senator Pedersen and Senator Synowiecki, I thought it was fair. And I think it sends a message. Okay?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
