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some apparent discrepancies between definitions, and that kind of thing. And then on page 15, line 10 of the bill, there was a "may" that you could argue should be a "may," should be a "shall." But in the end, it was decided there would not be a problem making it a "shall," and it could be interpreted in a very reasonable way by the department. So that's basically what the amendment is all about. I'd be glad to talk about any particular portion of it, but it's largely a rearrangement of definitions and an expansion on some definitions, and making clear that if certain things happen, that certain pesticides will be included on the list of state limited use pesticides. And with that, I would yield my time, with my thanks, to Senator Kremer, and allow him to use the rest of the time if he should so choose.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Kremer, eight minutes.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I just want to simply say that we support the amendments, and appreciate working with Senator Beutler. I think this bill came up on General File about two months ago, and there was a couple of things that were just little issues. One was the definition of "unreasonable." And we looked back in federal statute, many places it's used, and so we put a little definition in there for "unreasonable." Also then it was talked about progressively more rigorous restrictions on pesticides, and this...actually, what this bill does is conforms the Nebraska statutes with the federal provisions. And the...with the federal provisions, it expands pesticide contamination, not only just ground water or water, which it did in the original bill, but it expands it now to, if it has an effect on humans and the environment. And that was objected to in the place that it was, so we have a new section here, section (f), which defines progressively more rigorous pesticide management when it does affect water and humans and the environment. So I just wanted to thank Senator Beutler for working with us, and he's always very gracious about doing that. So please support the amendment and the bill. Thank you.
